

## Yes" Over "No": Government-backed constitutional changes approved in Armenia's referendum

With all ballots counted in the December 6 constitutional referendum, the Central Electoral Commission said early on December 7 that more than 63 percent of the voters have backed the reform under which Armenia will become a parliamentary republic.

According to preliminary results, more than 32 percent of the voters cast their ballots against the governmentbacked amendments.

The number of voters who voted in favor of the changes in absolute figures equals to 825,622, which is higher than the required threshold of some 637,000 (a quarter of all eligible voters) under Armenia's law.

Representatives of the ruling Republican Party and other parties that campaigned for the constitutional reform hailed the outcome, describing the referendum as a step forward.

The political parties and groups opposed to the changes dismissed the vote as fraudulent. They pointed to "widespread" violations during the vote, including ballot-box stuffing, open ballots, mul-

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tiple voting, vote buying, and others.

The opposition Armenian National Congress (HAK) dismissed the first official figures shortly after the CEC began publishing them after midnight. Levon Zurabyan, an HAK leader, said that in fact Armenians have overwhelmingly rejected

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## Armenian President addresses Climate Change Conference in Paris

On November 30, in Paris, Serzh Sargsyan participated at the 21st Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. The Conference, which is presided over by France, is attended by the Heads of state and government from 150 countries and by thousands of delegates. At the beginning of the meeting, delegations present at this Conference with the unprecedented high level of participation paid a one minute silence tribute to the memory of the victims of the November 13 terrorist attacks in Paris.

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According to the organizers, the presence of numerous world leaders at the Paris Conference in the wake of these tragic events proves that when it comes to confronting challenges presented to the entire humankind, civilization and solidarity are stronger than barbarity.

In their opening remarks the President of France Francois Hollande, the Minister of Foreign Affairs of France Laurent Fabius, who is presiding over the meeting, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon, Prince Charles of Great Britain and speakers after them underscored the importance of the 21st Conference for the future of planet Earth and humanity and noted that today people from all over the world are looking at Paris, expecting that as a result of the deliberations on the gravest challenge faced by the human kind - disastrous change of climate, with no delay there will be adopted a groundbreaking decision.

The speakers concurred that the Final Agreement of the Conference to be adopted on December 11, should not be just about good intentions: in their statements the world leaders should come up with



clear-cut and strong political messages to ensure that safe future of the humanity has no alternative.

In the statement made at the Conference, the President of Armenia first expressed gratitude to the President of France Francois Hollande for the excellent organization of the Conference on Climate Change and hospitality despite the terrorist attacks which shocked France and entire civilized world.

Considering climate change a global challenge, Serzh Sargsyan underscored that it threatens equally all states, regardless of their size or level of development. Even though Armenia's share in global emissions is not large and does not exceed two hundredth of a percent, according to the President Sargsyan Armenia attaches great importance to the need of combining efforts of all countries to address this issue and as a developing nation has committed herself to contribute to this global endeavor.

"The Armenian national position was reflected in the "Plan of Actions defined at the National Level" adopted by our Government. It is built upon the following principles:

First, global emissions of the green-

house gases shall be limited at the threshold, which would keep the temperature increase below the two degrees Celsius.

Second, we shall adopt an approach that is "general but differentiated," and take into account the varying degree of the current and historical responsibility of the numerous countries.

Third, the responsibility and burdensharing for limiting the emissions of greenhouse gases shall be distributed by taking into account the rights of the contemporary and future generations to utilize the climate resources.

And, finally, four, not to do anything that would make the developing countries to slide back.

Armenia stands ready to undertake a commitment of a quantitative limitation to the increase of the emissions of greenhouse gases," said the President of Armenia. In conclusion, Serzh Sargsyan underlined that the challenge of climate change, as well as other contemporary global threats that are of concern to us, recognize neither national borders, nor international law, nor any civilizational norms. According to the President, a challenge that a country may face in the modern interdependent and globalizing world is, in a collective sense, a challenge to all of us. Therefore, the solutions shall be comprehensive, agreed upon, and coordinated. The President of Armenia said that it is important for us to evaluate anew foundations of the global cohabitation, and refine the toolbox at our disposal. According to President Sargsyan, joint response to the challenges of climate change, should it be successful, may become a precedent for a new kind of endeavor.

### President Sargsyan meets PACE co-rapporteur on Armenia

President Serzh Sargsyan received on December 6 Alan Mill, PACE co-rapporteur on Armenia, who has arrived in Armenia to observe the referendum on Constitutional changes.

President Sargsyan said the periodic meetings provide an opportunity to discuss issues related to the comprehensive cooperation between Armenia and the Council of Europe.

Serzh Sargsyan hailed Council of

Europe's support to the reinforcement of democracy, protection of human rights and rule of law in Armenia, underlining that Armenia has been consistently implementing reforms over the past years.

Alan Mill, in turn, praised the preparatory work done before the referendum and hailed the close cooperation with the Venice Commission.

"Please, accept out best wishes for



your efforts towards Constitutional amendments," Alan Mill said.

## PACE releases statement on observation of Constitutional referendum in Armenia

A cross-party delegation of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE) was present in Armenia from 4 to 7 December 2015 to observe the referendum on constitutional reforms which took place on 6 December and led to a new constitution.

After a somewhat low-key campaign with little public debate and a calm referendum day, according to preliminary results, around 64% of those who voted did so in favour of the changes, thus meeting the quorum of 25% of the registered voters needed to approve the changes.

The relatively low turn-out, around 50% of the population, reflects the fact that the referendum was driven by political interests instead of the needs of the Armenian public and was perceived by many citizens as a vote of confidence in the government rather than on the many proposals for change. The two-and-a-half-year reform process was not inclusive enough, the parliament having only a few weeks to discuss the text and public debate being limited to two months, making it difficult for an agreement to be reached. Thus, the core of the constitu-

tional change - the shift from a presidential to a parliamentary system - was understood by too many citizens as being a means for the current president to remain in power after the end of his second (and what would have been final) term.

Concerning the voting process, the delegation regrets that the authorities were not more concerned by the integrity of the process leading to a new constitution and that it must mention several problems, many of them already mentioned in previous PACE, Venice Commission and OSCE/ODIHR recommendations:

- the inaccuracy of the voting lists containing the names of many people residing permanently abroad or even deceased, leading to claims that these identities were usurped by people who then voted several times;
- allegations of large-scale organized vote buying and carousel voting as well as pressure on voters;
- the media playing field was once again not a level one and the political parties were not able to fulfil their duties of informing and motivating the public;

- the misuse of administrative resources by executive bodies;
- allegations of pressure on, and attempts to corrupt, election officials;
- shortcomings in the training of precinct election officials, particularly during counting;
- the lack of mobile voting effectively excluded disabled citizens from the process.

The delegation urges the authorities to address these issues in order to build trust in the voting process and in politics in general to ensure a genuinely democratic future for Armenia.

While in Armenia, the delegation met leaders and representatives of parliamentary groups and parties, the Chairperson of the CEC, representatives of civil society and the media as well as OSCE/ODIHR experts.

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the amendments drafted by an ad hoc presidential commission. He cited referendum results from dozens of precincts indicating resounding "No" votes.

Zurabyan claimed that Serzh Sargsyan and the ruling Republican Party of Armenia (HHK) secured many of the "Yes" votes through ballot box stuffing, multiple voting and vote buying. In that regard, he also dismissed the CEC claim that almost 1.3 million people making up just over half of Armenia's eligible voters cast ballots on Sunday. The official voter turnout is "not compatible with the country's demography," he said.

Zurabyan and representatives of another major opposition party, Zharangutyun (Heritage), also accused government loyalists of disrupting vote counts in many other precincts where popular support for Sargsyan's constitutional package proved weak. A Zharangutyun proxy claimed to have been beaten up in one of those precincts located just west of Yerevan.

The CEC, which is dominated by Serzh Sargsyan allies, as well as the HHK

will reject the allegations. The CEC chairman, Tigran Mukuchyan, challenged the opposition to present documentary evidence of fraud in writing as hundreds of opposition supporters rallied on Sunday night near the commission's offices in downtown Yerevan.

The demonstration was organized by Zharangutyun and several other opposition groups aligned in the New Armenia Public Salvation Front. The alliance launched on Tuesday a campaign of street protests aimed at unseating Sargsyan. It has failed to pull large crowds.

The more moderate HAK and its allies will hold a rally in Yerevan's Liberty Square on Monday. "We expect to see many people in Liberty Square," Zurabyan told a late-night news conference. Speaking before the CEC effectively gave victory to the "Yes" camp, he said the HAK's further actions will depend on the official referendum results.

The referendum was monitored by several hundred observers deployed by Armenian civic groups in polling stations across the country. Many of them also reported serious irregularities.

By contrast, international vote-monitoring bodies like the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe and the Council of Europe sent only a handful of representatives to Armenia. This might be connected with the fact that neither the United States nor the European Union has endorsed or voiced concerns over the constitutional reform.

Also, the Council of Europe's Venice Commission gave a largely positive assessment of Sargsyan's constitutional amendments in September. The commission said they would mark a "further important step forward in the transition of Armenia towards democracy."

The HAK, Zharangutyun and other reform opponents maintain that Sargsyan is only keen to stay in power in a different capacity after serving out his second and final term in 2018. In a bid to disprove such claims, Serzh Sargsyan said last year that he will not seek to become prime minister or parliament speaker if Armenia switches to the parliamentary system. However, he pointedly declined to reaffirm that pledge in televised remarks aired on Thursday.

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### President Sargsyan speaks about Constitutional changes

In the evening of December 2, President Serzh Sargsyan gave a comprehensive interview to the representatives of the Armenian TV companies and answered multiple questions related to the Constitutional changes such as the necessity of initiating such changes and the objective behind it, significance of the changes for the state, arguments of those who speak against the changes in the Main Law, the validity of these arguments, etc.

Raising more questions about his long-term political plans, President Serzh Sargsyan has pointedly declined to explicitly reaffirm his earlier pledges not to remain in power after 2018 if he succeeds in transforming Armenia into a parliamentary republic.

In a rare interview with the leading Armenian TV channels aired on Thursday, Serzh Sargsyan strongly defended his efforts to expedite such a transition through sweeping constitutional changes put on a referendum to be held on Sunday.

He was asked by a reporter what he will do after completing his final presidential term in 2018 in case of a "Yes" vote in the referendum. "I think that we will talk about that after the 2017 parliamentary elections," he replied. "It's too early to talk about that now."

"Why am I saying 'after 2017?'?" Sargsyan said, answering a similar question from another TV journalist. "Because you can seriously speak of becoming prime minister or forming a government only if you have a majority in parliament. But if you don't have a majority in parliament, whether or not the constitution has been amended, how are you going to become prime minister? There would be no such possibility."

Serzh Sargsyan publicly stated in April 2014 that he "will not aspire to the post of prime minister" if Armenia does switch to the parliamentary system of governance. He thereby sought to disprove opposition claims that the main aim of his constitutional reform is to enable him to cling to power in a different capacity after 2018. The Armenian constitution bars the incumbent president from seek-



ing a third five-year term in office.

Senior representatives of the ruling Republican Party of Armenia (HHK) have since cited Sarkisian's pledge on numerous occasions. According to some of them, the president told the HHK's governing body in July 2015 that he will also not strive to become parliament speaker in 2018 in the event of enacting the controversial amendments.

Asked in the interview whether he is now backtracking on those promises, Sargsyan said: "No, no. I won't say I have never backtracked on my statements. But as a rule, I don't backtrack on anything in

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# Armenian soldier killed as NKR troops rebuff a fresh infringement attempt by Azerbaijan



An Armenian soldier was killed by Azerbaijani forces in Nagorno-Karabakh early on December 4 just hours after the United States, Russia and France urged the conflicting parties "in the strongest possible terms" to avoid ceasefire violations.

The Karabakh Defense Army said the 20-year-old soldier, Erik Grigoryan, was shot dead in an overnight Azerbaijani commando attack on its frontline positions in Karabakh's north. It said Azerbaijani forces also violated the ceasefire regime by firing 240 mortar shells and several rockets at various sections of "the line of contact" around Karabakh.

In a statement, the Armenian-backed army added that its frontline troops are taking "punitive actions to suppress the aggressive enemy activity."

Azerbaijan's Defense Ministry claimed the opposite; however, saying that Armenian forces themselves attacked Azerbaijani positions and suffered "big losses" as a result. It said one of its

servicemen, a warrant officer, was lightly wounded in the fire-fight

According to news reports from Baku, two Azerbaijani soldiers were killed on the Karabakh frontline earlier this week. The Azerbaijani military confirmed only one of those combat casualties: Fariz Novruzov. He too was a warrant officer serving on a contractual basis.

Armenian and Azerbaijani commando units mainly consist of contract soldiers.

Late on Thursday, U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov and a senior French official issued a joint statement expressing serious concern at this year's "significant escalation in violence" on the Armenian-Azerbaijani frontlines. "We appeal to the sides in the strongest possible terms to reduce tensions and protect lives," they said.

Foreign Minister Edward Nalbandian condemned the ensuing deadly incident in Karabakh as "Baku's response" to the mediating powers. He insisted that Kerry's and Lavrov's appeal was primarily addressed to the Azerbaijani side.

"Who is threatening to use force and restart war? Armenia? We've never done that," Nalbandian told reporters in Belgrade. He argued that Baku also continues to reject the mediators' proposal to set up a mechanism for international investigations into truce violations in the conflict zone.

Nalbandian further announced that the presidents of Armenia and Azerbaijan will meet later this month. But he gave no specific dates or venues for the meeting which the mediators hope will revive the Karabakh peace process.

# Heads of Delegation of Minsk Group co-chairing countries issue joint statement on Karabakh

The Heads of Delegation of the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chair Countries have issued a joint statement:

We, the Heads of Delegation of the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chair countries - Foreign Minister of the Russian Federation Sergey Lavrov, Secretary of State of the United States John Kerry, State Secretary for European Affairs of France Harlem Desir - remain united in our commitment to mediating a peaceful settlement of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict

We welcome the upcoming meeting between President of Azerbaijan Ilham Aliyev and President of Armenia Serzh Sargsyan under the auspices of the Minsk Group Co-Chairs. In light of the recent rise in tensions, we appeal to the sides to re-commit themselves to the peaceful resolution of the conflict and dispel any misperceptions that they are not serious about reaching a negotiated settlement. The sides should continue discussions from the Sochi, Wales, and Paris Summits of 2014 on elements of a comprehensive settlement, and should intensify their dialogue in 2016 on the basis of proposals currently under discussion.

With the significant escalation in violence along the Line of Contact and Armenia-Azerbaijan border this year, the status quo has become unsustainable. We especially condemn the use of mortars and other heavy weaponry, and regret deeply the civilian casualties these weapons have caused. There is no military solution to the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict, and there is no justification for the death and injury of innocent civilians. We appeal to the sides in the strongest possible terms to reduce tensions and protect lives. The Co-Chairs have proposed risk-reduction measures that we encourage the sides to adopt, including an OSCE investigation mechanism.

We welcome the progress made by the sides in implementing the data exchange on missing persons under the auspices of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). We encourage further cooperation with ICRC and must ensure that it has sufficient funding to fully implement this important humanitarian measure. Azerbaijani authorities' decision to return an Armenian soldier who crossed the Line of Contact and an Armenian civilian who crossed the international border was a helpful humanitarian gesture and consistent with international humanitarian obligations. We urge the sides to return all remaining prisoners in the spirit of the Astrakhan Declaration of October 2010 issued by the Presidents of Armenia, Azerbaijan, and the Russian Federation. There must also be dialogue



between Armenians and Azerbaijanis to build trust between neighboring peoples. We encourage the sides to work with the Co-Chairs to support programs that bring together people affected by the conflict.

Over the past year, we have witnessed increasingly vocal attacks on the Co-Chairs and the Minsk Group format. We emphasize that the Minsk Group remains the only accepted format by the sides and has the full confidence of all OSCE participating States. Any attempts to blame the Co-Chairs for setbacks in the negotiation process only mask the primary obstacle to peace - the lack of political will in Armenia and Azerbaijan to reach a negotiated settlement. The Co-Chairs will continue to brief international and regional organizations interested in supporting the Minsk Group process. We reaffirm our readiness to work closely with the sides on achieving our common objective of an enduring peace.

# French National Assembly sends Armenian Genocide bill to Justice Commission

The National Assembly of France voted on December 3 to send the bill on criminalization of the Armenian Genocide denial proposed by MP Valérie Boyer back to the Justice Commission, Hilda Tchoboian, Member of the French Rhône-Alpe Regional Parliament told Public Radio of Armenia.

The decision was made on grounds that more time was needed to make the text more precise.

Explaining the reasons behind the decision, Hilda Tchoboian said: "Valérie Boyer is an opposition MP in the National Assembly. The Socialist majority of the Parliament objected that the proposal was brought on the floor at an inappropriate time, and had to be completed in order not to be rejected by the Constitutional Council."

She added that regional elections are expected in France next Sunday, and the Left and the Right are trying hard to prevent each other from realizing the expectations of the Armenian community to secure their votes.

The bill was discussed by the parliamentary Justice



Commission on Nov. 25.

Turkey had suspended military, economic and political ties with France when the lower house of the French Parliament passed a similar bill in December 2011.

The French Senate then also passed the bill in January 2012, ignoring warnings from Turkey that passage of the legislation would lead to additional sanctions. A month later, France's Constitutional Council overturned the bill.

## President vows funding for Gyumri street repairs

Amid persistent allegations that his government deliberately neglects Gyumri because its residents overwhelmingly voted against his 2013 reelection, President Serzh Sargsyan promised on December 4 large-scale funding for repairs of the city's battered streets.

The move came just two days before a referendum on constitutional changes widely regarded as crucial for Sargsyan's political future.

The roads in Armenia's second largest city have been in an increasingly poor condition in the last few years. Most of them are now dotted with deep potholes and thick layers of mud. Some are practically impassable, placing residents of nearby buildings beyond the reach of public transport and taxis.

The Gyumri municipality, whose annual budget is equivalent to only \$6.5 million, estimated last December that as much as \$80 million is needed for resurfacing the local road infrastructure. With its tacit approval, the city assembly drew up a list of six major streets that were in a particularly urgent need of repairs worth \$2.6 million. The Armenian government rejected in 2014 the council's request to finance the road works, citing a lack of funds.

The rebuff only added to a growing sense among local residents that they are paying the price for Sargsyan's extremely poor showing in Gyumri during Armenia's last presidential election held in February



2013. Most of them voted for the main opposition candidate, Raffi Hovannisian, at the time.

In 2013, the central government also effectively froze the protracted construction of new homes for hundreds of Gyumri families still living in temporary shelters 27 years after a catastrophic earthquake that ravaged their city. Government officials have denied any political motives behind these decisions.

Meeting with Gyumri Mayor Samvel Balasanyan in Yerevan, Serzh Sargsyan said he has "given an instruction to raise 23 million euros" (\$25 million) that will be channeled into the local street network. In remarks broadcast by Armenian television,

he did not specify the source of funding for the road works.

Nor did the president mention Sunday's constitutional referendum, saying instead that Gyumri should be in good shape before the reconstruction of a major Armenian highway running through it is complete in 2018. He said "the process" will start as early as on Monday if Balasanian can guarantee efficient use of the funds.

Balasanyan thanked Serzh Sargsyan for the unexpected aid. He was also shown by state television saying that hundreds of new jobs will be created in the unemployment-stricken city by private businesses next year.

## Armenia says first year of EEU activity positive

Armenia positively views the results of the first year of the Eurasian Economic Union (EEU) work, the country's trade representative in the Russian Federation Karen Asoyan said at the opening ceremony of the Eurasian Economic Congress on December 1, TASS reports.

"In Armenia we're thoroughly analyzing the results of our membership - both in the government and in business," Asoyan said. "Our enterprises mainly speak about positive results. Many formalities concerning customs processing in particular, which are related to costs, are gone as the trade regime with the Union's states, Armenia's main partners, has become more open," the trade representative said.

He added though that there are some issues still in place. "The mechanism of VAT recovery hasn't been solved yet, which to some extend is restraining trade. This impacts trade (flows) from Russia to Armenia as well. Hopefully, the Eurasian Economic Commission will somehow solve the issue in the nearest future," Asoyan said.

Among major trends he mentioned more joint ventures being created by Russian and Armenian enterprises after the



country joined the bloc. "Russian tourist flow to Armenia has increased and developed," he added.

The trade representative also noted the importance of participation of the Eurasian Economic Union in formation of the Silk Road economic belt. "It would be important to construct a railroad from Iran to Armenia and reconstruct the railroad between Armenia and Russia," he said, adding that "this will allow creation of the shortest efficient way of supplying goods from the Persian Gulf countries to the EEU member-states."

## **EBRD** launches new strategy for Armenia



The European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) has adopted a new strategy for Armenia under which it will over the next four years give priority to enhancing the competitiveness of the private sector, improving the business environment, developing local the capital markets and funding infrastructure development.

Armenia's economic growth has slowed down this year as a result of the broader regional downturn which affects the country via reduced trade, remittances and investment flows. In addition, the depreciation of the Armenian dram and a decrease of foreign currency reserves have impacted the country's economy.

To speed up economic growth and support the government's

ambitious reform programme, which includes improving the business environment, the EBRD will focus on the following key priorities in its new strategy for Armenia:

- Enhancing private sector competitiveness: For Armenia's small and open economy, a significant improvement in competitiveness is key to attracting investment. The EBRD will continue financing the private sector. The Bank will target assistance for improvements to the regulatory and administrative environment and strengthen its assistance to micro, small and medium-sized enterprises.
- Developing capital markets and promoting local currency financing: As the authorities roll out mandatory pension reforms, the majority of pension fund investments will be channeled in local currency. Success will largely depend on the emergence of a healthy supply of capital market issues on the local market, and enough different investors to create market liquidity. The EBRD stands ready to support the development of the local capital market.
- Developing public utilities: Armenia's energy, transport and municipal infrastructure still needs much update. For this, it is important to increase private participation in public service provision. The Bank will support commercially viable energy and energy efficiency, transport and municipal service projects and engage in policy dialogue.

The EBRD is the largest single investor in Armenia. To date, the Bank has committed almost €950 million in over 140 projects in all major sectors of the economy.

## 27 years after the devastating earthquake in Spitak



December 7 marks the 27th anniversary of the destructive earthquake in Spitak. The earthquake hit 40 % of the territory of Armenia, densely populated region with 1 million people. The cities of Spitak, Leninakan, Kirovakan and

Stepanavan, as well as hundreds of villages were totally or partially destroyed. Twenty-five thousand people were killed, 500 thousand were left without shelter. 17% of the buildings were destroyed; the work of 170 industrial companies was

halted.

Immediately after the earthquake Armenians all over the world united and offered comprehensive support to the Motherland. "SOS Armenie," "Aznavour for Armenia" and tens of other organizations were created. Many Diaspora Armenians rushed to Armenia, bringing food, clothes and medicine.

Many of them - doctors, psychologists, constructors, architects - stayed in Armenia and personally participated in the rescue works.

A number of countries of the world continued to support Armenia years after the earthquake. Italians built a whole dwelling district in Spitak, Norwegians built a hospital, which was named after great humanist F. Nansen.

A school built by an Englishmen was opened in Gyumri. Prime Minister of Great Britain Margaret Thatcher participated in the opening ceremony.

# Armenia committed to working with partners to establish peace in Afghanistan

## Parliament of Aragon recognizes the Armenian Genocide



The Parliament of Aragon has adopted a declaration recognizing and condemning the Armenian Genocide. The text, which was tabled by MP Gregorio Briz Sánchez, pays homage to the over 1.5 million Armenian victims killed by the Ottoman Empire and asks all Turkish Institutions, including the government, to acknowledge this historical fact, the European Friends of Armenia (EuFoA) reports.

Given that 2015 marks the centenary of the Armenian Genocide many international organizations, such as the European Parliament, and political bodies have adopted motions commemorating it. Pope Francis also added his voice and recognized the Armenian Genocide in a declaration made in April. These events

were all referred to in the document adopted by Aragonese parliament.

In addition, the text pays tribute to the victims of the Armenian Genocide in a spirit of solidarity and European justice. It underlines that the European Union should make genocide prevention and punishment of crimes against humanity a top priority.

The resolution calls also on the government of Turkey to use the commemoration of the centenary of the Armenian Genocide as an opportunity to recognize it, open its archives and choose the path of reconciliation between the Turkish and Armenian people. It also highlights that a growing number of Turkish intellectuals, politicians and members of civil society have acknowledged the Armenian Genocide and encourages Turkish institutions to do the same.

The text furthermore calls on Spain to help ensuring Turkey keeps to it promise to protect and preserve the Armenian cultural heritage on its territory and to have a more active role in facilitating reconciliation between Armenia and Turkey. European history provides ample examples of reconciliation between nations which can serve as a model.

Aragon is an autonomous community in the north-east of Spain, bordering with France. It has a population of 1.2 million people and with a size of 47,719 km2 (slightly bigger than Estonia). It is the fifth region in Spain that has recognized the Armenian Genocide, after the Basque Country, Catalonia, the Balearic Islands and Navarre.

# Ara Guler cancels agreement to transfer his archive to Turkish pro-government company



Famous Istanbul-based photojournalist Ara Guler has cancelled an agreement, under which he was to transfer the archive of the photos he has taken over 70 years to Dogus Holding, cumhuriyet.com reported.

In accordance with the agreement signed on November 18 between Ara Guler and Dogus Holding closely connected with Turkey's ruling Justice and Development (AK) Party, 3 million euros worth of the archive, the building of Ara Kafe, and a collection of photographic cameras and devices were transferred to a company set up by Dogus for the purpose of managing the

archive and the property.

As a result of the transaction, Guler and his heirs were to be paid 50,000 liras a month. Guler would only have a 40% stake in the newly-established company's shares.

Ara Güler is an Armenian-Turkish photojournalist, nicknamed "the Eye of Istanbul" or "the Photographer of Istanbul". He is considered one of Turkey's few internationally known photographers.

In the 1970s he held photographic interviews with politicians and artists such as Winston Churchill, Indira Gandhi, Maria Callas, John Berger, Bertrand Russell, Willy Brandt, Alfred Hitchcock, Ansel Adams, Imogen Cunningham, Marc Chagall, Salvador Dalí and Pablo Picasso. Some critics consider his most renowned photographs to be his melancholic black-and-white pictures taken mostly with a Leica camera in Istanbul, mainly in the 1950s and 1960s, a golden age of photojournalism.

Güler's work is collected by the National Library of France in Paris; the George Eastman Museum in Rochester, New York; University of Nebraska-Lincoln Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery; Museum Ludwig Köln, and Das imaginäre Photo-Museum, Köln

## Minsk Group Co-Chairs Condemn Azerbaijan, Not Armenia, Says Nalbandian



Armenian Minister of Foreign Affairs Edward Nalbandian briefed the press on the results of an OSCE Ministerial Council meeting, which took place In Belgrade on December 3.

During a meeting with Armenian media, Nalbandian answered questions on the results of the meeting and his assessment of the OSCE Minsk Group's efforts, and Azerbaijan's lack of political will for a negotiated peaceful settlement of the Artsakh conflict.

Mr. Minister, will you brief us on the results of your meetings yesterday with the Co-Chairs? And also could you comment on the statement issued by the Foreign Ministers of the Co-Chair states on the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict?

Both the meetings and the statement are of the same logic. Now, after the statement, I can refer to it, around which the meetings were held.

What are the Co-Chairs speaking about? They are saying that there is no alternative to peaceful and negotiated conflict settlement. They refer to it several times in the statement and call on the sides to reconfirm their commitment to reach the settlement through peaceful negotiations.

The Co-Chairs have done it repeatedly. If you can remember, not only the Foreign Ministers of the Co-Chair states, but also the Presidents made such a call in their Enniskillen statement, minutes after Armenia reconfirmed its commitment. We did not hear Azerbaijan's position. And therefore, the call is directed to Azerbaijan.

The mediators say that the sides must dispel the impression that they do not take the negotiation process as a means for conflict settlement seriously. It is clear who that call is addressed to. And, who threatens to use force? Who threatens to unleash war? Armenia? Never! You represent media and you know that it is not true. The opposite side does it.

The Co-Chairs also call on the sides to give their consent over the creation of a mechanism investigating ceasefire violations. You know that after the last meeting of the Foreign Ministers in New York we reconfirmed that we agreed to create that mechanism. But Azerbaijan, in fact, refused. And it was mentioned in the press release issued by the Co-Chairs that they call on Azerbaijan to agree too it and that Armenia had agreed.

The Co-chairs strictly condemn the use of heavy artillery in their statement. Who uses heavy artillery? Is not it clear that the Azerbaijani side started to use heavy artillery recently? This means that they condemn Azerbaijan for using heavy artillery.

And at last, the Co-chairs once again express dissatisfaction over the severe criticism addressed towards the Co-chairs. Who does this? Has Armenia ever criticized?

I mentioned also in my speech at yesterday's plenary session that Armenia has never criticized the Co-Chairs. The Co-Chairs also say that the attempts to make the Co-Chairs responsible for non-progress in the negotiation process are an attempt to conceal the absence of political will. Whose political will? Azerbaijan's.

So everything is clear. I think that the Co-Chairs have made correct assessments. The question is to what extent Azerbaijan will pay attention to those assessments and to what extent Azerbaijan will adequately realize the calls of the international community.

Because the OSCE Minsk Group format is the only format that has an international mandate, and it was also mentioned in yesterday's statement. It has been given by all the OSCE member states and also, as they say, enjoys the confidence of the sides. If one of the sides repeatedly criticizes, does it mean that they support the format? Of course not.

We hope that this statement by the heads of the delegations of the Co-Chair states will have its importance in terms of moving forward with the negotiation process.

It was also announced yesterday that a high-level meeting, meaning at the presidential level, is planned which will take place soon in December.

The time and the place of the meeting have not officially been announced yet. It will be done as required according to the consent of the sides.

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According to Armenpress, journalists also asked questions about the developments that took place after the statement was issued, specifically the announcement by Turkish Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu in Baku, saying that every centimeter of Azerbaijan's "occupied territories" must be liberated and that Turkey will stand side by side with Azerbaijan. Later this morning, Azerbaijan violated the ceasfire repeatedly in an attempted advance across the line of contact, resulting in the loss of one Armenian soldier.

Nalbandian told media representatives not to be surprised by Turkey's announcements, as they are not something new.

Nalbandian also said that during his meetings with the Co-Chairs, he told them that Azerbaijan softens tensions before OSCE Ministerial Council meetings, as they have always done. But, when a statement is issued, like the most recent one following an OSCE Ministerial meeting in Belgrade on Thursday, it is immediately followed by escalation of tensions, and this morning's violations is proof of that.

According to Nalbandian, this is Baku's answer to the Co-Chairs' call for refrain from the use of force.

# Colorado Governor proclaims December 6 as Djulfa Commemoration Day

In an official proclamation, Colorado Governor John Hickenlooper declared December 6, 2015 as the 10th Anniversary of Djulfa Destruction - joining global commemorations of Azerbaijan's genocidal destruction of 2,000 Djulfa (Jugha) khachkars, reported Armenian National Committee of America - Western Region.

Gov. Hickenlooper's proclamation memorializes "the deliberate destruction of the world's largest collection of medieval khachkars at Djulfa; [which] has been documented by the American Association for the Advancement of Science." The proclamation further mentions that "the State of Colorado commemorated the 100th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide this year by unveiling a Capitol khachkar memorial, a replica of one of Djulfa's 2,000 destroyed monuments" and that "Coloradans are encouraged to visit the State Capitol and view the replica Djulfa khachkar."

"Colorado once again demonstrated its unwavering commitment to human rights," remarked ANCA WR Executive Director Elen Asatryan. "Governor Hickenlooper's authorization and unveiling of the Colorado State Capitol Khachkar on April 24 was a staunch expression of support to the 1.5 million victims of the Armenian Genocide as well as an unprecedented tangible action to restore a piece of medieval Armenian culture lost in a genocidal destruction. We are so proud that Colorado's Armenian community has become such a vibrant voice in their state's democratic process and are grateful to Governor Hickenlooper for his strong leadership and commitment to issues important to our community and human rights advocates worldwide."

The Proclamation will be read by Colorado's Douglas County Public Defender and Djulfa descendant Ara Ohanian later today at the Shine a Light on All Genocides candlelight vigil and program in Denver, organized by Armenians of Colorado (AOC) in partnership with ANCA-Colorado, the Colorado Coalition for Genocide Awareness & Action, and the Consulate General of Armenia in Los Angeles.

December 2015 marks the 10th anniversary of Turkic Azerbaijan's genocidal destruction of 2,000 medieval khachkars, when the army of Azerbaijan utilized heavy technology to conduct an operation against helpless cultural monuments. Despite the fact that the destruction was caught on tape and further documented with satellite evidence. Azerbaijan continues to deny the existence of and the destruction of Djulfa. The destruction of Djulfa was the final step of carefully-planned and executed wipeout of Nakhichevan's indigenous Christian heritage in line with official historiography in Azerbaijan that claims Armenians did not live in that region until the 19th century. This is often seen as a continuation of Turkey's pan-Turkic genocidal policy against indigenous Armenians, which started with discrimination then organized massacres and ethnic cleansing, followed by denial and destruction of physical evidence, and is one of the reasons why the Nagorno-Karabakh Republic (Artsakh) has argued that any rule by Azerbaijan over it would be tantamount to genocide. social life or politics. I just don't want to mix a noble cause with another cause."

The ambiguous remarks could give more ammunition to opposition groups campaigning against the passage of the amendments. Levon Zurabian, a leader of the Armenian National Congress (HAK), pounced on them when the opposition party and its allies held another rally in Yerevan on Thursday.

"Serzh Sargsyan has refuted his loyalists' claims that he has no desire to reproduce his regime," Zurabyan said in a

speech. "With his statement, he has exposed his entire plan to retain power."

The HAK and other reform opponents claim that the proposed amendments would "perpetuate" Sarkisian's rule by making it easier for the ruling HHK to win the next parliamentary elections. They point to a clause that allows for the possibility of a run-off ballot if the first round of voting does not result in a "stable majority" in the National Assembly.

Sargsyan countered that the elections will not go into a second round if the top election contenders cut a power-sharing

deal. He said that even in the event of a run-off the election favorite would need to form alliances with other major parties or blocs. This alone would democratize Armenia's political system, he added.

Serzh Sargsyan further argued that Armenia's existing, supposedly semi-presidential system is fraught with potentially serious conflicts between the president of the republic and a government formed by a parliament dominated by his political opponents. "That is a threat to our security," he said. "We would address it by raising democracy to a higher level."

### Beachwood artist explores Armenia in art exhibit

Cleveland.com - Art is always personal. But it goes beyond that in the case of Jeanette Arax Melnick.

Yes, there is a personal side in works by the Beachwood artist, who will exhibit her paintings at the Beachwood Branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library during the month of December.

You can see it in "The Quince Tree," a work that was inspired by a photo of her and her father, taken when she was a little girl, in 1946. The photo is in the work itself, along with photos of her grandchildren, children and husband.

But her relationship with the world is as much spatial one - in which she absorbs aspects of it through the senses or through patterns rather than just the heart or mind.

"Sometimes I just look at the world and see all these geometric shapes and I see aspects of my paintings in them," says Arax Melnick. "Like right now I'm sitting in a room looking at pillows or I could be looking at an oriental carpet and finding interesting patterns."

There is little pattern when it comes to divining the Fresno, Ca. native's style - which shoehorns folk art and "museum type art," as she likes to say.

"Art was always my companion and I never sought out to follow a particular style or painter," she says. "I started to study painting at (University of California, Berkley), but I switched to history because I realized that I wanted to be my own painter."

She delved into medieval history, along with the "flatness" found in its art. She has created in the shadows of a family history that extends back to the Armenian genocide of 1915 - which led to her family settling in California.

"Armenian history is very complicated, especially with Turkey denying the genocide of 1.5 million Armenians," says Arax Melnick, whose husband Daniel Melnick recently released a novel that honors the memory of the genocide. "And yet that complication has given me a feeling for the suffering of all mankind."

"As a child, I was inspired looking at old Armenian manuscripts and seeing these people with big brown eyes and soulful looks," she adds. "They look like they've suffered and yet survive and go on."

Sid Vicious - the English punk from a much later time, 1970s London - captivated her in a very different way.

"I never listened to his music, though I know Aaron and Lennie have," says Arax Melnick, referring to her sons, co-founders of legendary Cleveland hardcore band Integrity. "I just loved his face and the zippers."

For years, the painting hung at the old Arabica on Coventry. Arax Melnick received a number of offers for it, but chose to hold onto it.

"It's hard to give up on that Sid Vicious," she says. "I've never looked at the money side of it."

It's all matter of perspective, even when it comes to art.

"I tend to avoid perspective and I think it's given my work a certain character," she says. "I'll have a table that looks like it's floating and could see it as an illusion, but to me it's just how I see it and see the world. So I guess you could say the world is an illusion, too."



## Armenian Genocide recognition advocate Ragip Zarakolu awarded PL Foundation Peace Prize

Publisher and human rights defender Ragip Zarakolu has been awarded PL Foundation Peace Prize for his extraordinary efforts in the areas of freedom of thought and expression.

Zarakolu will receive the award by PL Foundation President Poul Sögaard on November 10 in Copenhagen. PL Foundation Peace Prize is awarded to organizations and people who struggle for democracy without resorting to violence within the scope of United Nations

Declaration of Human Rights.

Zarakolu has published a number of books on the Armenian Genocide. He has visited the Armenian Genocide memorial complex on the sidelines of his numerous stopovers in Armenia.

Ragip Zarakolu was born in 1948 on Heybeliada, the second largest of the Prince Islands, in Istanbul. He started publishing with his wife, Ayse Nur Zarakolu in 1977. He never abandoned his struggle for "popularizing respect for different ideas and cultures in Turkey" despite pressures, his books being seized or destroyed, heavy fines and being sent to prison. Zarakolu serving as the President of Publishers' Union of Turkey Committee of Free Publishing has worked on Kurdish question and condition of minorities in Turkey.

Zarakolu lastly was arrested together with his son Deniz Zarakolu within the scope of Group of Communities in Kurdistan (KCK) case\* in 2011. He remained in prison until April 2012.

# Armenian community in Canada gives a wide welcome to refugees

The Armenian community of Toronto is opening its arms to Syrian refugees.

With the help of the Armenian Community Centre, a government-sanctioned sponsorship agency, community members over the past two years have filed applications to co-sponsor about 2,500 Armenian-Syrians who fled Syria because of mounting violence. Some 1,300 have already been approved, and about 300 have been welcomed this year.

According to Citizenship and Immigration's map of approved sponsorships, as of Nov. 24, about 2,600 Syrian refugees are waiting to come to the GTA. Willowdale - where there is a concentration of people of Armenian heritage - is expected to receive about 1,079 of those. In the initial wave, sponsors from downtown Toronto will receive a further 1,326. Mississauga sponsors will get 68, 33, Thornhill North York Etobicoke 18, Oakville seven and Oshawa five.

Citizenship and Immigration says about 4,511 files of privately sponsored refugees outside Quebec are currently being processed.

Some 74 people have arrived since Nov. 4. But Ottawa has said it will resettle 25,000 Syrian refugees across the country by the end of February - no easy task, given the logistics of screening, processing and transporting the families here.

The exodus from Syria has been described as the worst humanitarian crisis since the Second World War, with more than 4 million Syrians fleeing violence in their homeland and seeking refuge in neighbouring Lebanon, Jordan and Turkey. A further 7 million Syrians have been displaced internally.

Apkar Mirakian, who is in charge of the Armenian Community Centre's resettlement program, says applications continue to flood the office, many for friends or extended family members currently living in Jordan or Lebanon.

Besides processing applications, the centre has set up a committee to aid sponsors in finding accommodation, clothing and furniture for the new arrivals. The local Armenian private school has agreed to waive tuition for all children for their first year, said Mirakian.



The centre is also networking now to find potential jobs for refugees, to help them get on their feet as soon as possible. "We're reaching out to Armenian businessmen," said Mirakian. "We've gone to Mideastern supermarkets. Loblaws is hiring in their warehouse in Ajax."

Just when the bulk of this wave of Syrian-Armenian refugees will arrive is uncertain, Mirakian said. Resettling them can be stressful, he acknowledged.

"It's very tiring, but it's rewarding. At night you go home and say you've done something good today."

For Greg Ghitilian, a community sponsor of two Syrian refugee families, says that for Armenians there is a deeper meaning behind this act of humanity. "My dad and his family had been refugees in 1915 to 1920," and they fled to Syria from Turkey (which he describes as western Armenia). "Syrians accepted us, as Christians, and the Syrians are now in the same predicament. They are in neighbouring countries, with the kids... It's heartbreaking."

The Maksoudlian family, who arrived from Beirut in August, and the Nersesian family, who came in September, both stayed at first with Ghitilian's family in their Markham home. Now, they're on their own, with visits and occasional assistance from Ghitilian and his family as they transition to a new life in Canada.

The centre's settlement program has been successful, he believes, because so many want to "pay it forward." Everyone wants to help out, he says, pointing to the enthusiasm of friends and neighbours who contributed furniture and clothing as he waited for the families he sponsored to arrive. He received so much he had to use part of his garage to store everything.

"You have to rely on the larger community to pull off something like this."

In letters addressed to the Armenian Embassy in Italy and the Union of Armenians of Italy, L'Aquila Mayor Massimo Cialente informed that the City Council of Cialente recognizes the Armenian Genocide on its centennial and expresses its solidarity with the Armenian people as a confirmation of protection of historic truth and human rights.

# Sara Corning, the woam who helped save 5,000 Armenian orphans

Anyone with a penchant for dates and history may recall that in 1922, Marconi began making regular broadcasts from England, the British Broadcasting Corp. was established, and 14 republics formed the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

It's also the year that Ecuador gained independence, and when Josef Stalin was appointed general secretary of the Communist Party.

A lesser-known story that also unfolded in 1922 - yet one with huge historical import - involved a woman from rural Nova Scotia and the fate of over 5,000 Armenian orphans.

Meet Sara Corning.

Corning was born in Chegoggin, Yarmouth County, in 1872. After finishing high school, she went to New Hampshire to study nursing - a plucky thing for a young woman to do back then.

In December 1917, she heard about the Halifax Explosion and immediately went there to help.

Shortly after, Corning joined the American Red Cross and was eventually assigned to the Near East Relief, which was providing humanitarian services to the Armenians who were being massacred by the Ottoman Turks.

In 1922, Corning travelled to Constantinople (now Istanbul, Turkey) where the Near East Relief was headquartered. From there, the 50-year-old was sent to the Armenian capital to be in charge of an orphanage. She also worked in refugee camps.

By year's end, she was stationed on the coast in Smyrna (now Izmir) - a city characterized by disaster and chaos.

Corning later recounted in the Kimball Union Alumni Bulletin that "the Turkish army was just taking the city as we arrived."

"The place was crowded with many sick refugees and we opened a clinic to take care of them as best we could, but it was soon closed by the soldiers."

She wrote about looting, the city being set afire and how many of the refugees jumped into the harbour and drowned rather than be burned alive.

Under great peril, Corning gathered the children from the orphanage there and led them through the burning city to safety aboard an American ship, where they were taken to Constantinople. She later established an orphanage for them on the island of Syros in Greece.

In June 1923, Corning was invited to Athens, where King George II of Greece presented her with the Order of the Knights of St. Xavier for her courage and bravery.

The following year, Corning returned to Turkey, where she continued to work and care for orphans. She also adopted five children. Although they did not always live with her, she provided for their well-being and education.

Fast-forward to April 21, 2004, when the Canadian Parliament passed Bill M-380 recognizing the deaths of over 1.5 million Armenians from 1915 to 1923 as a genocide

Earlier that month, His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, issued a statement titled Message of Blessing, which included a tribute to Corning.

It said in part: "The name of the late philanthropist Sara Corning is very cordial and precious to Armenians living around the world. (We) acknowledge with deep gratitude her efforts to salvage several thousands of their compatriots living in Turkey ... they were saved thanks to the unwavering humanitarian works of Sara Corning."

Local historian Susie Sweeney was recently commissioned by the Yarmouth Waterfront Development Corp. to write content about Corning for an interpretive panel that the town intends to install in Frost Park

Sweeney said that in the past, older people in Chegoggin knew about Corning's story, but no one made a fuss. Nor did Corning ever bring attention to herself; hence, very few people in Yarmouth know her story.

Sweeney added that "Sara was strong in her faith and dedicated her life to serving humanity."

"Her attitude seemed to be that she had a job to do and simply got on with it."

The Yarmouth County Museum and Archives has a large display that houses the heroine's nursing uniform and other items such as her passport and the medal she was awarded from the King of Greece.

Jennifer Rodney-Chown, a native of Yarmouth now living in Fall River, has had a lifelong interest in the characteristics of peacemakers and humanitarians.

Captivated by Corning's story, Rodney-Chown and her husband, David, left on a Mediterranean journey this past summer in hopes of learning more.

There were many highlights, including a week's stay in Syros.

"It was an emotional experience for me after researching about Sara these past years," she said.

Rodney-Chown learned from their hosts at Hotel Ploes about an Armenian woman in town who might be a relation to an orphan from Smyrna and could be found selling loukoumi and nougat (sweet confections) in a shop adjacent to the town's square.

It didn't take the Rodney-Chowns long to find the shop and its owner, Constantina Sykutri.

"Behind her on the wall were black and white historical photos of Smyrna!" said Jennifer Rodney-Chown. "Her father was one of the Armenian orphans. She belongs to an Armenian group who keep the traditions and the memories alive."

Another highlight was to visit the area where the orphans were relocated. Although the red-roofed buildings are still standing, they are used as military barracks.

Because it was a weekend, no one was available to authorize entrance. So their driver took them to a location overlooking the buildings to take photos.

"This is where Sara gathered all the children together to form with their bodies the scripture verse: Second Corinthians 1:8-11, where they were photographed from a plane," said Rodney-Chown. "The verse expressed the suffering they experienced and the miracle of their survival through God's help and those who cared for them."

Rodney-Chown has huge admiration for her distant cousin and hopes that the town of Yarmouth will not only install the interpretive panel Sweeney worked on, but will also erect a statue in her honour.

"Sara showed through her life that no matter what history lay before (us), the extended hands of understanding, friendship and assistance are powerful and healing wherever mutual openness exists. Sara gave all that and more: in Halifax, in Turkey, in Greece ... when a door opened, she walked in and gave her best, truly helping others to survive and thrive."

Although Sara Corning is not a household name in Nova Scotia, she is well-known to the Armenian community in Canada. In September 2012, the Sara Corning Centre for Genocide Education opened in Toronto.

After her retirement, Corning moved back to her childhood home; she died in 1967. Her headstone in the Chegoggin Baptist Church Cemetery reads: She Lived To Serve.


"It's like the last thing Kanye and I did when North was born," she shared. "We didn't name her for like seven days. I feel like it will just come to us."
