Nikol Pashinyan meets with Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, His Holiness Karekin II



Prime Minister Nikol Pashinian praised the Armenian Apostolic Church and acknowledged its "special significance" for many Armenians when he met with its supreme head, Catholicos Garegin (Karekin) II, on November 14.

It was apparently the first one-on-one meeting of the two men at the church headquarters in Echmiadzin since Pashinyan swept to power in May in a wave of mass protests organized by him. The premier has been very critical of Garegin in the past.

"For us, for our people, for our country, the values of the Armenian Church have a pivotal significance for identity. This perception has always guided and is continuing to guide us," Pashinyan told Garegin in his opening remarks.

"The Mother See of Holy Echmiadzin has a special significance for the lives of our people, for every adherent of the Armenian Apostolic Church, including me and my family," he said. "And in general, one must visit the Mother See of Holy Echmiadzin from time to time. This is also the most convenient place to reflect on the past and the future."

For his part, Garegin wished Pashinyan success in his "patriotic endeavors." The Catholicos also said that he will take the opportunity to discuss with him "solutions to a number of issues preoccupying our church."

Official press releases on the meeting gave no further details.

Pashinyan had denounced Garegin's perceived acquiescence of the deadly breakup of post-election opposition protests staged in Yerevan in 2008. The 43-year-old former journalist was one of the main speakers at those protests.

Shortly after the success of the Pashinyan-led "velvet revolution" Garegin came under strong pressure from an obscure group accusing him of having close ties with the country's former government and demanding his resignation. Dozens of its members partly occupied his Echmiadzin headquarters in July. Police waited for several days before forcing them out of the premises.

The slow police reaction prompted strong criticism from representatives of the former ruling Republican Party (HHK) and other conservative critics of Pashinyan's government. They portrayed it as further proof of what they see as government contempt for "traditional Armenian values."

HHK lawmakers went on to draft a bill that would ban any protests inside church premises. Pashinyan's cabinet rejected the bill last month.

The Armenian Apostolic Church is one of the world's oldest Christian denominations to which the vast majority of Armenians nominally belong. Armenia's constitution affirms its "exceptional mission."

Artsakh President's meetings in Paris

Artsakh President Bako Sahakyan met in Paris with the leaders of the French structure of the Armenian Revolutionary Federation Dashnaktsutyun and discussed issues related to the Artsakh domestic and foreign policy, Artsakh-Diaspora cooperation and regional trends.

The President attached importance to such meetings and extended his gratitude to the representatives of the party for their special attitude towards Artsakh.

Bako Sahakyan next met with Armenia's Ambassador to France

The meeting addressed issues of enhancing the Artsakh-France

ties. President Sahakyan highlighted the role of close cooperation between the diplomatic missions of Artsakh and Armenia in developing bilateral relations as a necessary precondition for the successful implementation of targeted programs.

At a meeting with a group of members of the France-Artsakh Friendship Circle the President noted that the development of relations with France is one of the fundamental directions of Artsakh foreign policy.

He expressed gratitude to members of the Circle for the efforts made to deepen and expand bilateral relations. POLITICS 3


Nikol Pashinyan: "We must hold elections in line with best international standards"

A Cabinet meeting was held on November 15, chaired by Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan. Before discussing the agenda items, Nikol Pashinyan touched upon the scheduled snap parliamentary elections.

"The pre-election stage is in full swing; the deadline for applications for participation in snap parliamentary elections is over, and our government has assumed political responsibility to hold elections. We have set a task to hold the best ever elections in the history of the Third Republic. I think the bar should be raised: we should say highest international standards-compliant elections rather than the best election in the Third Republic's history.

In this regard, as I stated in the National Assembly yesterday, we need to emphasize that the use of administrative resource should be ruled out in these elections. In particular, I mean a number of traditions inherited from the past, when general schools were involved in political processes. We need to eradicate the phenomenon when administrative levers are used to direct voters in one direction or another. There used to be such people who told us who we should vote for. This phenomenon should be ruled out, and the voter's decisions should be formed as a result of propaganda and political content," Nikol Pashinyan said.

The Acting Prime Minister emphasized that the official results of elections should be formed exclusively according to the ballot. "We should exclude even a ballot paper, as it is commonly said to be put in a wrong rack, and not only in



the inter-party, but also in the intra-party format. What do I mean? Since the rating system is still operational, votes are distributed not only between parties, but also between different candidates within the same party. Of course, we have to convey a very clear and strict message: anybody making such an attempt will be strictly punished," the Acting Premier said.

The next problem, according to Nikol Pashinyan, is the direct or indirect practice of vote bribing. "I hope our law-enforcement bodies - particularly the Police and the Special Investigative Service - are prepared to not only adequately respond to the situation, but also to prevent this phenomenon through prophylactic work. During the election campaign, we will provide for a truly free competition between political parties, there should be no restrictions on access to respective audiences: all political forces should have equal opportunities to communicate with voters,"

Nikol Pashinyan said.

The Government decided to authorize the Yerevan Mayor to sign a new agreement on behalf of the Republic of Armenia with EMC CJSC concerning the rights, obligations and responsibilities of the State and the contracting side during the property alienation process in the area enclosed by in Arami, Buzand and Y. Koghbatsi streets.

Highlighting the program's importance, Nikol Pashinyan noted: "We must work to that effect. There are also 8 units of architectural monuments in the given area. Our policy is that they should not be damaged in any way, let alone the scenario of demolishing them at all. We are working with the investor to amend the project so that the monuments could remain intact during project implementation."

The fourth program under the Government's Open Government Partnership Action Plan has been approved. It has been developed on the basis of proposals made by government agencies and civil society. The 4th program consists of 11 commitments, covering such areas as transparency of budget funds, establishment of an actual owners' registry based on best international standards, transparency and accountability for educational, health, water and land data, etc.

Concerning three bills submitted by NA deputies in the form of a legislative initiative on making additions and amendments to the Tax Code of the Republic of Armenia, Acting Prime Minister Nikol Pashinvan noted that all these issues can be discussed in the context of the Tax Code Reform. "It turns out that due to political processes, our Tax Code-related plans may be reconsidered in terms of timetable," he said, adding that the Tax Code will have to be adopted by this January.

According to Nikol Pashinyan, the electoral campaign is another good opportunity to hold public debates on the Tax Code Reform. 4 POLITICS

Armenia insists on keeping top CSTO post

A representative of Armenia must run the Russian-led Collective Security Treaty Organization (CSTO) until 2020, Foreign Minister Zohrab Mnatsakanyan insisted on November 16.

Russia and five other ex-Soviet states making up the alliance agreed in 2015 that their representatives will take turns to serve as the organization's secretary generals on a rotating basis. They appointed Armenia's Yuri Khachaturov to that position in 2017.

The new Armenian government cut shot Khachaturov's three-year tour of duty after he was controversially charged in July in connection with the 2008 post-election violence in Yerevan. It hoped that another Armenian official will be allowed to replace Khachaturov.

Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan insisted on that at a CSTO summit held in Kazakhstan's capital Astana on November 8. Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko as well as Kazakh President Nursultan Nazarbayev demanded, however, that a representative of Belarus be named as new head of the CSTO.

The CSTO leaders said they will again try to reach consensus on the issue when they meet again in Saint Petersburg, Russia on December 6.



In an interview with the Russian TASS agency, Mnatsakanyan said this does not mean that another Armenian official cannot become new head of the CSTO. He said Armenia must keep the vacant post as it has a "good cadre potential for that."

"The organization comprises six equal members and they make decisions by consensus," stressed the minister.

Lukashenko reiterated his demands when he met on Monday with a senior diplomat from Azerbaijan, a country which is at war with Armenia and not part of the CSTO. He noted that another Russian-led bloc, the Eurasian Economic Union, is also run by an Armenian

"This is a very heavy burden for a country which is going through a period of transition," added Lukashenko. "Can Armenia carry that burden?"

The Armenian Foreign Ministry denounced Lukashenko's comments.

Kocharyan's remand appeal overturned



YEREVAN—Armenia's Court of Cassation on November 15 reversed an appeals court ruling to free former president Robert Kocharyan who was remanded into custody after being charged with breaching Armenia's constitutional order in connection with the March 1, 2008 post-election violence that led to the killing of eight civilians and two police officers.

On July 27 Kocharyan was charged and remanded into custody. An appellate court overturned a lower court's decision on the remand and on August 13 he was released from pre-trial custody. The court ruled then, citing Armenia's Constitution, that current and former leaders of Armenia were immune from prosecution.

On November 15 ruling by the Court of Cas-

sation, Armenia's highest criminal appellate court, satisfies Armenia's Prosecutor General's request of remand. However, the court sent the case back to the appellate court for review. Kocharyan could be arrested following a ruling by that court.

Kocharyan has vehemently denied the charges, calling the entire process a "political vendetta."

In another ruling on Thursday, the Court of Cassation reversed a lower court's ruling free former president Serzh Sarkisian's lead bodyguard Vachagan Ghazaryan on bail. Immediately after the ruling, Ghazaryan was remanded into custody.

Ghazaryan was charged on June 25 of falsifying income statements and false asset declaration. At the time of his arrest he was carrying \$500,000 cash, which he said he was going return to an unnamed owner. Investigations also revealed that he was going to attempt to withdraw \$3 million from his and his wife's accounts

Bail was set for 1 billion drams (\$2.5 million), which was paid before being freed from pre-trial detention.

Government to enable qualified professionals to be involved in public administration

Actingr Prime Minister of Armenia Nikol Pashinyan has said that the government will enable qualified professionals to work in public administration.

"During my 6 months premiership one of the most fair complaints that I heard is the following: people are complaining that by being high professionals they are often unable to reach the country's prime minister to propose their services for the benefit of the Republic of Armenia," Pashinyan said on Facebook.

He said that he has decided to create a working, consultative mechanism to deal with the issue. He called on all those who are convinced that they deserve to be involved in different branches of public administration to send resumes and motivation letters to cv@gov.am.

"Just one request, in this case too the selection is a highly discretionary process and I am ask-



ing not to feel insulted or rejected in any event. After all, if willingly or unwillingly you are being subjected to injustice, with your own co-

herency you will be able to prove your justness in any stage. I know this for sure. Also, with my own example," he said.

European Film Festival kicks off in Armenia

The grand opening of the European Film Festival took place November 17 at Yerevan's Moscow Cinema. New movies from 11 European countries will be screened in the festival.

Screenings will take place in Yerevan, Gyumri and Dilijan.

"Armenia is the country of Sergei Parajanov," said EU Ambassador Piotr Switalski. "A country that has had its huge and valuable contribution in cinematography in many countries worldwide and in Europe. We see that the Armenian audience is watching films of various productions – Hollywood, Bollywood, MosFilm, and we thought why not show European production movies to the Armenian society? We believe that through this festival we will be able to strengthen the bridge between the Armenian society and the expanded European society," he said.

The festival kicked off with the screening of Colette – a 2018 biographical drama, directed by Wash Westmoreland, based upon the life of the French novelist Colette.

The film stars Keira Knightley, Dominic West, Eleanor Tomlinson, and Denise Gough.

The EU delegation announced about the festival earlier on November 13.

Armenian, Italian presidents discuss enhancement of ties in Rome

Armenian President Armen Sarkissian and Italian President Sergio Mattarella held a meeting on November 17 in Rome, the president's office said.

Sarkissian is currently on a working visit to Italy.

The presidents discussed issues concerning the further deepening of the Armenian-Italian relations, Sarkissian's office said.

They mentioned that high-level mutual visits will significantly contribute to enhancing bilateral relations and will boost the development of cooperation between the two coun-

tries

Sarkissian briefed his Italian counterpart on the meetings and agreements he had during his visit to the country.

The presidents underscored that broad opportunities for cooperation exist in both economic, cultural and scientific sectors and attached importance to full utilization of the existing potential.

Sarkissian had a number of meetings in Italy, including with ANCE executives, the CEO of Leonardo and Italian National Research Council president.

ADB approves \$50 million loan Enhance Financial Markets in Armenia



The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved a \$50 million policy-based loan as part of an ongoing program of financial reforms to strengthen public debt and fiscal risk management and develop financial markets in Armenia.

The second subprogram of the Public Efficiency and Financial Markets Program supports the Government of Armenia's efforts to consolidate fiscal reforms, reduce financial risks in the economy, provide a sustainable framework for financial markets development, and usher in a more conducive environment for private sector involvement in infrastructure development. ADB provided \$40 million in October 2017 to the first subprogram.

"ADB is committed to helping the Gov-

ernment of Armenia improve its economic growth and financial stability outlook through policy and technical assistance," said ADB Senior Financial Sector Economist Mr. João Farinha-Fernandes. "The reforms that enabled the approval of this \$50 million policy-based loan will continue the efforts laid out in the first subprogram."

While financial institutions in Armenia have improved their contribution to the country's economy over the years, financial markets remain nascent. This limits the development of the private sector in the country, which is vital for Armenia's growth and development. This situation is also affecting public finance, fiscal management, as well as macroeconomic and financial stability in the country—factors that are crucial in improv-

ing investment levels in Armenia, which has declined to 18% in 2017 from about 40% of gross domestic product before 2009.

Through various policy reforms, the Public Efficiency and Financial Markets Program is aimed at strengthening Armenia's public debt and fiscal risk management through capacity building of various agencies including the Public Debt and Management Department as well as the Ministry of Finance. It also aims to improve the government's securities market and money-market infrastructure, while broadening the range of financial instruments available to attract more private investments in the country. The second subprogram continued these reform efforts.

If the reforms are sustained, more developed financial markets will help Armenia in various ways, including supporting government funding in the domestic market; developing local capital markets; providing suitable instruments to authorities to deal with macroeconomic shocks and risks to financial stability; and improving the efficiency of capital allocation and intermediation in the country.

ADB is committed to achieving a prosperous, inclusive, resilient, and sustainable Asia and the Pacific, while sustaining its efforts to eradicate extreme poverty. Established in 1966, it is owned by 67 members—48 from the region. In 2017, ADB operations totaled \$32.2 billion, including \$11.9 billion in cofinancing.

Armenian gas operator accused of tax evasion



Tax authorities have accused Armenia's national gas distribution owned by Russia's Gazprom giant of evading millions of dollars worth of taxes.

The State Revenue Committee (SRC) announced the launch of criminal proceedings against the Gazprom Armenia operator on Wednesday. The SRC claimed that the company inflated its expenditures and underreported its earnings in 2016 and 2017. It said that translated into "several billion drams" in unpaid

taxes.

No Gazprom Armenia executives have been formally charged yet.

The head of the SRC's investigative division, Eduard Hovannisian, told RFE/RL's Armenian service on November 15 that tax inspectors are still "ascertaining" the scale of the alleged tax evasion. "The criminal investigation has only just started," he said.

Gazprom Armenia strongly denied the accusations. "I insist that they are base-

less," its chief executive, Hrant Tadevosyan, told a news conference.

"Our company has repeatedly received SRC certificates of a 'law-abiding taxpayer,' most recently in September," he said

Tadevosyan also accused the government agency comprising the Armenian tax and customs services of damaging the gas operator's business reputation. He claimed that the criminal case has called into serious question Gazprom Armenia's plans to obtain a multimillion-dollar loan from a Russian commercial bank.

The SRC brought the tax fraud case amid ongoing negotiations between the Armenian government and Gazprom on the price of Russian natural gas delivered to Armenia. The most recent Russian-Armenian gas agreement set the price at \$150 per thousand cubic meters. It expires in December.

The government hopes that Gazprom will cut the tariff or at least keep it unchanged. The Russian gas monopoly has given no such indications so far.

Transportation, communication and IT commission set up at Public Council

The new commission of transportation, communication and information technology affairs of the Public Council elected a chairperson during its inaugural sitting.

The commission is comprised of 42 members.

UEICT (Union of Employers of Information and Communication Technologies) president and UNICOMP founder Armen Baldryan, one of the two candidates for the commission chair, was elected to office.

The commission is composed of representatives of leading companies of the sector who are willing to bring forward fresh ideas in the system, raise issues and propose innovative solutions.

Baldryan expressed hope that the commission will become a productive and mutually beneficial arena for cooperation between the government and the specialized community.



U.S. sanctions on Iran 'explained' to Armenian Government, Banks

(Yerevan – RFE/RL) A team of U.S. officials has visited Armenia to brief its government and private sector on the implications of economic sanctions against neighboring Iran that have been re-imposed by President Donald Trump.

The U.S. Embassy in Yerevan said the "subject matter experts" from the U.S. departments of state and treasury met with senior Armenian government officials on November 15 as part of Washington's efforts to "explain U.S. sanctions policy against Iran to governments around the world."

"They also met with the Deputy Governor of the Central Bank of Armenia as well as with private banks, members of the American Chamber of Commerce in Armenia, and Armenian academics and think tank experts," read an embassy statement.

"The delegation emphasized U.S. efforts to change the Iranian regime's malign behavior through maximum economic and diplomatic pressure, while also outlining areas for cooperation with partners like Armenia," it added.

Armenian government bodies issued no statements on the discussions with the visiting U.S. officials.

The discussions came less than a month after U.S. National Security Adviser John Bolton's trip to Armenia. The renewed U.S. sanctions against Tehran were a major theme of his talks with Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan and other Armenian leaders.

Bolton said he told them that the Trump administration will enforce the sanctions against Iran "very vigorously" and that the Armenian-Iranian border is therefore "going to be a significant issue."

"Obviously, we don't want to cause



damage to our friends in the process," Bolton told RFE/RL's Armenian service. "So I think conversation between the government of Armenia and the United States is going to be very important."

Speaking in the Armenian parliament a few days later, Pashinyan said he made it clear to Bolton that his government will maintain Armenia's "special" relationship with Iran. "We respect the national interests of any country, but the Republic of Armenia has its own national and state interests which do not always coincide with the interests and ideas of other countries," stressed Pashinyan.

Bolton tweeted after his visit that Armenia is an "important friend" of the United States.

With Armenia's borders with Azerbaijan and Turkey closed due to the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict, Iran as well as Georgia serve as the sole conduits for the landlocked country's trade with the outside world.

Armenia also imports Iranian natural gas and other fuel. The volume of the gas supplies should rise sharply after the ongoing construction of a third power transmission line connecting the two countries is completed next year.

Accordingly, both the current and former Armenian governments have supported a 2015 multilateral accord on Iran's nuclear program that led to the lifting of the U.S. sanctions. Trump unilaterally pulled out of that deal earlier year.

Foreign Minister Zohrab Mnatsakanyan commented on the move's possible impact on the Armenian-Iranian relationship in an interview with the Russian TASS news agency published on Friday.

"For us, this is a highly sensitive issue because Iran is an important partner of Armenia with which we have ... a bilateral agenda extremely important to Armenia," said Mnatsakanyan.

U.S. officials have yet to publicly say which Armenian-Iranian commercial operations, if any, could be affected by the renewed sanctions.

According to official Armenian statistics, Armenian-Iranian trade stood at \$263 million last year. Pashinyan and Iranian President Hassan Rouhani discussed ways of expanding it when they met in New York in September.

Newly-Elected House Democratic Majority Will Paralyze Trump's Presidential Powers

The midterm elections held on November 6, 2018, will significantly restrain President Trump's rule of the United States as a dictatorship.

In the first two years of his presidency, Trump often abused his powers by signing Executive Orders and by controlling both the Executive and Legislative branches of the U.S. government through the Republican majorities in both the House and Senate. Armenian-American Candidates in the Midterm Elections

On the positive side, at least eight Armenian-Americans won local, state and federal political seats during the Nov. 6, 2018 midterm elections.

Armenian-American Anna Eshoo (Dem.-CA) won reelection to the House along with Jackie Kanchelian Speier, another Democrat from California. Armenian-American Anthony Brindisi (Dem.-N.Y.) is 1,293 votes ahead of the incumbent Republican Congresswoman Claudia Tenney as of election night, pending thousands of votes yet to be counted. If Brindisi wins, he will be the third Armenian-American serving in the U.S. House of Representatives.

In the history of the United States, there have been only seven Armenian-Americans elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. They are:

- Thomas Corwin (1831-1840; 1859-1861), Republican from Ohio.
- Steven Derounian (1953-1965), Republican from New York.
- Adam Benjamin (1977-1982), Democrat from Indiana.
- Charles Pashayan (1979-1991), Republican from California.
- Anna Eshoo (1993-present), Democrat from California.
- John Sweeney (1999-2007), Republican from New York.
- Jackie Speier (2008-present), Democrat from California.

Incredibly, Thomas Corwin, of Armenian and Hungarian descent, was a highly-accomplished politician and diplomat. He is the only Armenian-American who became a U.S. Senator (1845-1850), a Republican from Ohio. Besides his service in the House and the Senate, Corwin was the Governor of Ohio (1840-1842), and U.S. Secretary of the Treasury (1850-1853). In addition, he served as U.S. Ambassador to Mexico (1861-1864).

Danny Tarkanian, Republican congressional candidate from Nevada, lost his election bid on Nov. 6, running against Democrat Susie Lee. Tarkanian trailed with 43.4% of the vote to

Lee's 51.4%.

Johnny Nalbandian, Republican congressional candidate from the Glendale, CA area, lost his election bid to incumbent Democrat Cong. Adam Schiff. Nalbandian had 23.5% of the vote to Schiff's 76%.

Democrat Adrin Nazarian from the San Fernando Valley region of Los Angeles won reelection against Republican challenger Roxanne Hoge for the California State Assembly. Nazarian won 77.9% of the vote to Hoge's 22.1%

Elizabeth Warren (not to be confused with U.S. Senator Elizabeth Warren), granddaughter of Armenian Genocide survivors, lost her election for the California State Assembly to fellow Democrat Tasha Boerner Horvath.

Republican Rita Topalian lost her race for the State Senate against Democrat Bob Archeleta, who won by 65% of the vote.

Outside of California, Mari Manoogian, 26, Democratic candidate for Michigan State House, defeated her opponent former Michigan GOP chair David Wolkinson, with 57% of the vote vs. Wolkinson's 43%. Manoogian was endorsed by President Barack Obama, Sen. Gary Peters, and Governor-Elect Gretchen Whitmer.

Another Armenian-American candidate, Sara Gideon, a Democratic member of the Maine House of Representatives, was reelected.

Anna Astvatsaturian Turcotte was re-elected to Ward Three on Westbrook, Maine's City Council. Turcotte, a refugee from Baku, Azerbaijan, is a strong advocate for Artsakh's independence.

Finally, Lorig Charkhoudian, a Democratic candidate for Maryland's House of Delegates, was elected to become the first Armenian-American to serve in the Maryland State legislature.

Most Armenian-Americans who ran for political office on Nov. 6, won. The same is true for many non-Armenian supporters of the Armenian-American community. The Armenian National Committee of America reported that 92% of the congressional candidates it endorsed won their seats. This is great news!

On the other hand, Armenian-Americans are pleased that Cong. Pete Sessions (Rep.-Texas), co-chair of the Congressional Caucus on Turkey, lost his reelection bid, despite contributions to him by pro-Turkey donors!



Armenian Parliament rejects pro-church bills



Deputies from Serzh Sarkisian's Republican Party (HHK) walked out of the Armenian parliament on Friday after failing to push through bills meant to protect the supreme head of the Armenian Apostolic Church against physical threats.

The HHK drafted the two bills after Catholicos Garegin II faced calls for his resignation following this spring's "velvet revolution" in Armenia.

An obscure Armenian group launched a series of protests against Garegin in June, accusing him of corruption and close ties with the country's former government. Dozens of its members partly occupied his Echmiadzin headquarters in July. Some of them also physically confronted Garegin when he subsequently travelled to a medieval monastery in the southeastern Vayots Dzor province.

Police waited for several days before forcing the protesters out of the Mother See of the Armenian Church. This prompted strong criticism from the HHK and other conservative critics of the newly elected Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan. They accused the government of showing contempt for "traditional Arme-

nian values."

One of the HHK bills would ban any demonstrations inside church premises. Pashinyan's cabinet spoke out against the bill last month. Only 43 members of the 105-seat National Assembly voted for it.

Citing this summer's incidents, HHK lawmakers also drafted separate legal amendments that would obligate the state to provide Garegin with bodyguards on a permanent basis. Some of them seemed to imply that the summer protests against him were provoked by other, non-traditional religious groups active in the country.

"We want to protect the Catholicos against sexual and religious minorities that are financed from abroad and fight against the Armenian statehood and Armenian faith," the HHK's Hakob Hakobyan said during a heated parliament debate.

"Our church is an inseparable part of our national security. Anyone who is against that church is also against national security," declared Samvel Nikoyan, another deputy representing the former ruling party.

Lawmakers allied to Pashinyan rejected the bill. One

of them, Lena Nazarian, said there is no need for such legislation because the government will protect the Catholicos whenever he feels that his security is at risk.

Another pro-Pashinyan deputy, Sasun Mikaelyan, argued against "protecting the Catholicos against the people." Mikaelyan said the HHK itself is responsible for Garegin's perceived unpopularity because the latter had grown too close to the previous government.

"Against whom is the prime minister protected by his security detail? Against the people?" countered the HHK's Margarit Yesayan.

The Armenian Revolutionary Federation (Dashnaktsutyun) also backed the HHK initiative, saying that not only Garegin but also the church as a whole needs stronger state protection. "I don't think it's right to put the Catholicos in a situation where he himself has to ask for protection," said Armen Rustamian, Dashnaktsutyun's parliamentary leader.

Only 28 mainly Republican deputies voted for the bill. Their colleagues representing Gagik Tsarukyan's Prosperous Armenia Party, the second largest force in the outgoing parliament, abstained.

"This is the most disgraceful vote in independent Armenia's history," charged Eduard Sharmazanov, a deputy parliament speaker affiliated with the HHK.

"There may be 28 of us today. There will be 2,800 of us tomorrow and 2.8 million the day after," Sharmazanov said before he and several other HHK parliamentarians walked out in protest.

The Armenian Church's official position on the proposed legislation is not known. Its chief spokesman could not be reached for comment on Friday.

The HHK bills were debated two days after Pashinyan visited the Echmiadzin seat of the church and met with Garegin. The premier acknowledged the church's "special significance" for many Armenians. Few other details of their meeting were made public.

Pashinyan had strongly criticized Garegin in the past.

The Armenian Apostolic Church is one of the world's oldest Christian denominations to which the vast majority of Armenians nominally belong. Armenia's constitution recognizes its "exceptional mission" in the country's history and social life.

Premier of Australian state of Victoria pledges \$35,000 for Armenian Community Center

The Premier of the Australian state of Victoria, the Hon. Daniel Andrews MP has announced that, if re-elected, his government will provide \$35,000 funding towards the upgrade of the Armenian Community Center (Hye Getron), located on Police Road in Springvale, reported the Armenian National Committee of Australia (ANC-AU).

With the Victorian State Election scheduled to take place on Saturday 24th November, the ANC-AU - Melbourne Branch has sought meetings with incumbents and candidates in Armenian-populated seats. Andrews is the current Member for Mulgrave, which is populated by many Melbourne Armenians, while it also houses the Armenian Community Centre (Hye Getron).

Following discussions with Andrews's office, ANC-AU - Melbourne Branch secured the \$35,000 grant, which will upgrade the carpark and fencing of the centre, which also houses the Hamazkaine Mesrob Mashdots Matheossian Saturday School.

Andrews, who has been the Labor Premier of Victoria since 2014, reaffirmed his support for the Armenian community by stating: "Our Armenian community makes a proud contribution to Victoria and I'm proud to offer this support. With these investments, we'll will make sure that the Armenian Community Centre has the facilities it needs to keep serving Armenian



Victorians for years to come."

ANC-AU - Melbourne Branch Chairman, Asbed Boymoushakian thanked the Premier for his commitment before outlining his team's next steps.

"This is a great result for our community," he said. "Many of our unsung heroes who work in the background to make this Centre a true home for so many of us will wholeheartedly appreciate the commitment provided."

Boymoushakian added: "An upgrade for our Community Centre is thoroughly appreciated. Importantly for us at the Armenian National Committee, elections are opportunities to build on relationships that will allow for advancement of our community's core public affairs priorities, including Armenian Genocide recognition and the self-determination rights of our brothers and sisters in Artsakh, which we will focus on within the next Parliamentary term."

ANC-AU - Melbourne Branch is in discussions with the campaign of the Liberal Party's candidate for the seat of Mulgrave, Ms Maree Davenport to seek her position on the funding commitment.

International meeting on Syria to be held in Astana November 28-29

The international meeting in Astana to resolve the situation in Syria will be held November 28-29, TASS reported citing the Kazakh foreign minister's statement

"The guarantors of the 'Astana process' - the Russian Federation, the Republic of Turkey and the Islamic Republic of Iran agreed to hold the next, 11-th international high-level meeting on Syria in the framework of the 'Astana process' on November 28-29 in the capital of Kazakhstan," TASS quoted Foreign Minister of Kazakhstan Kairat Abdrakhman-



ov as saying.

He said that the meeting is

planned "in the traditional format with the participation of delega-

tions of the countries-guarantors, the government of the Syrian Arab Republic, the Syrian armed opposition, observers are invited to this meeting - the UN and Jordan."

In Astana, nine rounds of talks were held to resolve the situation in Syria. The main result of the meetings in the capital of Kazakhstan was the creation of de-escalation zones, which significantly reduced the level of violence in the country.

The last meeting in the Astana format at a high level was held in Sochi, Russia on July 30-31.


